

Frances Kellor's Timeline

- 1873 Born, October 20th, in Columbus, Ohio
- 1873 Moved to Coldwater, Michigan
- 1889 Possibly shot her own hand and moved in with the Eddy sisters
- 1895 Entered Cornell Law School
- 1897 Graduated from Cornell Law School
- 1898 Entered University of Chicago
- 1899 Journeyed south for prison research
- 1901 Published *Experimental Sociology*
- 1902 Moved to the New York College Settlement House
- 1903 Moved in with the Dreier sisters
- 1904 Published *Out of Work*
- 1906 Founded the National League for the Protection of Colored Women
- 1908 Appointed to the New York Commission on Immigration
- 1909 Organized a New York branch of the North American Civic League
- 1910 Became the head of the Bureau of Industries and Immigration and thus the first woman to run a state agency
- 1911 Merged her National League for the Protection of Colored Women with two other groups to form the National Urban League
- 1912 Left the Bureau of Industries and Immigrants to lead in Theodore Roosevelt's Presidential campaign
- 1912 Launched the Progressive Party's activist branch, The Service
- 1914 The New York Department of the Service became the Committee for Immigrants in America (CIA)
- 1915 Created Bundle Day
- 1915 Began funding the Division of Immigrant Education under the Bureau of Education
- 1915 Published a new version of *Out of Work*
- 1915 Began publishing her journal, *Immigrants In America Review*
- 1915 Launched Americanization Day
- 1916 Ran the Women's Campaign Special for Charles Hughes' Presidential bid
- 1916 Became the Assistant to the Chairman of the Immigration Committee of the National Chamber of Commerce
- 1916 Published *Straight America: A Call to National Service*
- 1917 Named the head of the Division of Aliens in the Resource Mobilization Bureau of the Adjutant General's Office
- 1917 Appointed Special Advisor on War Work among Immigrants for the Federal Government
- 1918 Launched the Inter-Racial Council
- 1918 Installed as President of the American Association of Foreign Language Newspapers
- 1919 Stopped subsidizing the Bureau of Education
- 1920 Published *Immigration and the Future*
- 1921 Published *The Federal Administration and the Alien*
- 1924 Published *Security Against War*
- 1926 Became Vice President of the American Arbitration Association
- 1952 Died, January 4th. Buried in Brooklyn, Green Wood Cemetery
